#### Notice of Water and Sewer Rate Changes

On December 18, 2017, the Enfield Water & Sewer Commissioners (Board of Selectmen) voted to adjust water and sewer rates in accordance with the formal recommendations offered by the Town Manager and Public Works Director. The new rates will be effective January 1, 2018 and will appear in the 2018 first quarter bills arriving in your mailbox the first week in April 2018.

The updated rate charge chart is included on the reverse side of this letter. Water consumption rates have been split into two separate rate classifications. The first category is customers consuming <u>up to</u> 9,999 gallons per quarter. Users in this classification will be charged \$2.00/1000 gallons. The second category is customers consuming 10,000 gallons or more per quarter. Users that fall within this classification will be charged \$2.50/1000 gallons (although it should be noted that the higher consumption charge will only apply to those gallons consumed over and above the 9,999 gallons/quarter billed at the \$2.00 rate). There is no change to the fixed rates with respect to water. The sewer consumption rate has been increased 10% on both classifications of consumption (the first class being up 23,999 gallons/quarter and the second class being 24,000/quarter or greater). In addition, the fixed rates have been increased for the first time since 2007. Please consult the detailed rate charge chart being mailed to your home for a breakdown of these changes.

You will notice a column on the rate chart labeled "deficit reduction charge." This is a **temporary** 40% charge based on consumption that is designed to eliminate the existing operating deficit in the Sewer Fund (this is presently estimated to be approximately \$700,000) within a period of five years. <u>Once</u> the deficit is eliminated, the corresponding deficit reduction charge will be removed from sewer bills. The deficit has been growing steadily for nearly a decade due to revenues not keeping pace with expenses. The primary growth of expense is wastewater treatment at the Lebanon wastewater treatment plant which accounts for nearly 70% of the total Sewer Department's yearly expenses.

The Water & Sewer Commissioners, Town Manager, and Department of Public Works are committed to keeping the Water and Sewer Departments financially sustainable while delivering quality water and sewer services for the future. Several new projects are underway that will help to control future costs, and this includes a thorough evaluation of alternative methods of treating Enfield's wastewater. ### **Route 4A Sewer Extension Project Update**

Kingsbury has completed a preliminary startup of the Lakeview pump station with the Town. The pump station is currently functioning as intended with minor electrical work remaining. Additional work is expected in the Route 4A sewer manholes over the next few weeks. Kingsbury has completed the majority of the on-site Lakeview main sewer lines and structures and has begun hookup of services. They believe that they will compete the service work by mid-January, at which point in time the project will go into a winter shutdown. Decommissioning of the existing wastewater systems at Lakeview, final restoration of Lakeview and Shaker Landing roadways, final restoration of lawns and grasses, and installation of the remaining finishes around the pump station will be completed in May, 2018.

Conkey Enterprises has started work on the Shaker Landing Pump Station replacement portion of this project under a separate contract. The majority of the force main line has been installed as well as 50% of the gravity sewer lines. The pump station structures have been delayed slightly by the manufacturer and are expected to arrive around January 8<sup>th</sup> for installation. At that point Conkey and their subcontractors will complete the pump station components, which is expected to take 3-5 weeks depending on weather and receipt of materials. A winter shutdown will occur for this work once the new pump station is up and running. The natural access drive, restoration of lawns and grasses and decommissioning of the existing pump station is expected in May, 2018.

### Changes to the Transfer Station Hours of Operation – Effective Jan. 1

The Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, department heads and other local officials are committed to identifying ways to minimize or reduce Town spending while at the same time sustaining the quality of municipal services offered to our residents and visitors.

As was reported in more detail in the December issue of the town newsletter, the Board of Selectmen recently voted to adjust the Transfer Station hours of operation. More specifically, the new hours will be as follows beginning <u>January 1, 2018</u>:

### **Driveway Sand**

Driveway sand is available at the DPW during their business hours (Monday-Friday from 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM) and is located at the top of the driveway in the bin on the right. It is open to Enfield residents with a current Transfer Station Stickers. It is not intended for commercial applicators or to be taken in commercial volumes. Salt and ledge sand is NOT available.

#### Winter Parking Ban

The Enfield Board of Selectmen wishes to remind citizens of Enfield that the Winter Parking Ban is in effect from November 1 through April 1. No vehicle shall at any time be parked on any public or publicly maintained street, alley, roadway or way open to the public, in a manner that hinders the maintenance of the way. # MASCOMA LAKESIDE PARK FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN - NEW UPDATES!

In December, an official subcommittee of the Board of Selectmen was formed to spearhead fundraising efforts to help the Town of Enfield acquire two shorefront lots on Mascoma Lake that were recently declared as surplus by NH DOT. Mascoma Lake is a treasured resource

that should be available to all members of the

Enfield area, not just lake front property owners. The Town is pursuing acquisition of these parcels to further the objective of enhanced public access

and enjoyment of the lake.

The Board of Selectmen held a public hearing on December 4 to officially establish of a new temporarily restricted purpose trust fund where donations made in support of land acquisition and improvements for the Mascoma Lakeside Park property will be deposited. All donations will be tax deductible. The Board of Selectmen also officially established the fundraising committee and laid out its mission.

The fundraising committee is about to officially kick off a campaign to begin raising funds from private foundations, businesses, and individuals to (1) purchase the two lakefront lots, (2) offset the costs associated with various planned capital improvements (i.e., construction of new facilities to enhance public use of the property), and (3) offset future operating and maintenance costs associated with the property. When the cost of the land and the immediate planned capital improvements are all factored in, it is anticipated that approximately \$500,000 will need to be raised.

NH DOT is in the process of commissioning its own staff appraisal of the property. Once that is completed, the matter will be referred to a legislative committee to determine who will be the next owner of the parcels. The Town has received indications from NH DOT that Enfield will be offered the opportunity to purchase the land at fair market value. It should be noted that in anticipation of a possible purchase of the land, the Town retained the services of an independent appraiser to appraise the properties in 2016. The findings of this appraisal will inform future negotiations on sale price.

# **PLANNING & ZONING OFFICES**

### **Planning Board Activity**

- The Planning Board had one meeting in December.
- The Planning Board continued the hearing on allowing two additional housing units at 60 Main Street. Due to a lack of access to necessary parking lots, the approval was not given. There is discussion on leasing land to the building owner.
- The Planning Board also heard a request for a boundary line adjustment from the Upper Valley Land Trust and a neighbor on the large lot recently acquired. The property bisects a small pond, and the Trust agreed to relocate the boundary line to have the pond all on its neighbor's land.
- The Board also heard from Upper Valley Automotive on Route 4A on a site plan requesting an accessory use to provide U-Haul rental vehicles on the land at Route 4A. The Board approved the request with the condition they do not exceed five vehicles on the site.
- The Town Planner reported to the Board that the remaining condition for final acceptance of the Evenchance Subdivision has been settled. The condition was assurance that any damage done to properties from water running off the site while under construction would be properly settled. The Contract has agreed to provide insurance coverage for any damages to the abutting properties. The attorneys for the Town and the Town's insurance company have agreed the coverage provided is appropriate. The final acceptance will be at the next Planning Board meeting (scheduled for January 24).
- The Topic of monthly meetings of the Planning Board came up. There was a consensus that the Board schedule one meeting per month to hear cases brought forward. The current schedule calls for two meetings. The Board agreed to the one meeting, but would accept a second hearing if an applicant has a pressing need.

# **Zoning Board Activity**

- The Zoning Board had one meeting in December.
- The Zoning Board heard a request for a variance to install a 100 sq ft sign to a building located off Exit 14 on I-89. The request was approved, with the fact that the sign would be allowed if it was free standing and

that with heavy traffic on I-89, the large sign makes it much easier to read.

- The Zoning Board also denied a request to have a second housing unit on a property. The updated Zoning Regulations allow for two residential units in all zones that allow single family homes, but not as separate or detached buildings. The board did not find sufficient cause to grant the variance to the Zoning Regulations.
- The New Hampshire Supreme Court held a hearing on the Foley Case This case involves a new lakefront building to replace an old cottage on a lot that does not have the required setbacks. Pertinent points debated were the ex- parte communication, which had information that was not available to the opposing attorney, and the question of allowing incremental zoning violations. The final decision and the date the final decision will be released are not yet known.

# **Other Meetings of Interest**

- The Scenic Byway Committee held a meeting to review the responses from the Department of Transportation on the responsibilities of the Scenic Byway and the recently developed Corridor Management Plan. They are required to write long and short term plans for up keep of the Scenic Byway. There was a consensus for the committee on how to meet the DOT requests.
- The Tax Increment Finance (TIF) Committee met to discuss any projects they will recommend for funding in the 2018 budget. The committee decided to not suggest any new spending and only continue the yearly payment on the note for the Route 4 water and sewer system extension.

#### Longtime Enfield Highway Supervisor Has Retired

In 1982, a young man named Mike Sousa came to work for the Enfield Highway Department. After 36 years of dedicated service, including more than a decade as the Highway Supervisor, Mike has retired last month. During his employment with the Town Mike was a truck driver, grader operator, laborer, flagman, assistant supervisor, loader operator, snowplow driver, roadside mower operator, supervisor, stonemason, fixed waterlines, mowed lawns and completed thousands of other tasks. Mike was always known as motivated, hardworking and conscientious. He always showed a great deal of pride in the maintenance of the Enfield Town roads, which have been recognized as some of the best around the Upper Valley. If you see Mike around town please thank him for his many years of service and wish him well. The new Highway Supervisor is Scott Johnston who has been with the Town for 17 years.

#### Please Use Curbside Trash and Recycling Services

Trash and Zero Sort recycling collected at the Transfer Station cost the Town of Enfield significantly more per ton than trash and recycling collected curbside due to extra hauling charges. Trash collected at the Transfer Station costs approximately \$30 per ton more than material collected curbside (when Transfer Station transportation fees are included). Zero-Sort recycling collected at the Transfer Station costs the Town over \$80 per ton more than recycling collected at curbside due to the extra hauling fees (when Transfer Station transportation fees are included).

#### Please Recycle to the Fullest Extent Possible

The Town's current contracted solid waste hauler, Casella, has produced a brochure that outlines the materials that can be recycled via the Zero-Sort program. This brochure can be accessed here: <u>https://www.casella.com/sites/default/files/2017-02/BROCHURE-TriFold-ZeroSort-2017.pdf</u>

Remember, <u>recycling is not only socially and environmentally responsible, but</u> <u>it dramatically reduces the hauling fees incurred by the Town</u>. At present, the Town pays Casella \$68.68 per ton for trash disposal and \$35 per ton for recyclables collected at the curb. That's a significant cost difference. Please do your part to <u>help keep our solid waste expenses down (and keep property tax</u> rates as low as possible in the process)!

### **Narcotics Investigations**

The Enfield Police Department conducted several narcotic investigations in recent months. The cases focused on individuals selling heroin. These investigations are very complex and require a coordinated and regional response; we applied for a state grant to work with the Lebanon and Canaan Police Departments over the next year in an effort to reduce the flow of these deadly drugs into our communities. We continue to maintain a visible presence on the streets to prevent thefts. Most addicts spend anywhere from \$500-\$1000 per week on their drugs. Thefts are one of multiple ways they are able to support their habit. We also need your help. If you see someone or something suspicious please call us immediately.

### Speeding

Complaints of speeding vehicles continue to be an issue. We have deployed our

radar trailer as well as patrols to help bring attention to motorists speed. Most of the complaints take place on our neighborhood streets. Please be mindful of your speed and respect your neighbors concerns.
